

Three events with our ladies high- lighted the first half of 1994. We celebrated General Washington's birthday with luncheon for almost 70 people at the Philadelphia Club. Gregory T. Knoft was the featured speaker. He is a fellow, at the Philadelphia Center for Early American Studies, a program sponsored in part by the Pennsylvania Society. He spoke about factors that motivated Revolutionary War soldiers, and concluded that men from different areas often fought for very different reasons.
